



The Book of Genesis: Its Purpose and Preamble

The Patriarchal Stories (Genesis 12-50) is the Purpose of the Book of Genesis

The Primeval Stories (Genesis 1-11) is the Preamble of the Book of Genesis






Genesis 1:1-2:3 in summary










Does Genesis 1 conflict with Science?







There are two books laid before us to study, to prevent our falling into error; first, the volume of the Scriptures, which reveal the will of God; then the volume of the Creatures, which express His power.



The theologian searches <u>God's Word</u> to find out *who* God is and *why* he has made the world and humanity (2 Timothy 3:14 – 17).

The scientist searches <u>God's world</u> to find out <u>what</u> God is like and <u>how</u> he has made the world and humanity (Psalms Keswick Ministries 19:1; Romans 1:20).

St. Augustine: About the Theologian and the Scientist

"It happens that even a non-Christian knows some things about the earth, heaven, and other elements of this kind, about the motion and the rotation, size and intervals of stars, about the eclipses of the sun and moon, about the orbits of years and times, about the animals, crops, jewels and other things of this kind in such a way that he holds those by a most certain reason and evidence in Ministries

St. Augustine: About the Theologian and the Scientist

"But it is a disgraceful and deadly thing – and one most certainly to be avoided – that an unbeliever would hear a Christian speaking about these things as if expounding Christian writings in some delirious manner so that by seeing him wrong about all of heaven, he could scarcely keep from laughing. And it is not so annoying that such a Christian errs but that those outside believe that our authors [of the Scriptures] were in fact saying such things."

Enuma Elish: A Mesopotamian Creation Story (discovered in 1849)





Enuma Elish is a story about gods and goddesses of Mesopotamia, and a decisive battle between *Tiamat* (the goddess of the sea) and Marduk (a young and daring god of the divine council)

Tiamat the chaotic goddess of the sea





Marduk the chief god of Babylon





And how Marduk killed Tiamat in battle . . .





How Marduk creates the heavens and the earth!

Marduk cuts Tiamat's corpse in half, and with one half he creates the heavens and with the other he creates the earth.



How Marduk creates human beings using the blood of a defeated god!

"I will knead blood and bone into a savage, 'Aborigine' will be its name.

These aborigines will do the divine assembly's work.

These savages will set the divine assembly free.

Marduk put the aborigines to work

He set the divine assembly free.

What an incredible accomplishment!"



Enuma Elish and other similar 'creation-stories' would have formed the worldview of the people of the ancient world.



1. The Six Days of Creation: Forming and Filling





2. The Emphasis on Words and Phrases

- •"God" 35 times
- •"Earth" 21 times
- •"Heavens" 21 times
- •"And it was so" 7 times
- •"God made" 7 times
- "God saw that it was good" 7 times



3. 'Opening' and 'Concluding' sections

Genesis 1:1 - 2

Genesis 2:1 - 3

1:1 is made up of exactly 7 words (7×1)

2:1-3 is made up of exactly 35 words (7×5)

1:2 is made up of exactly 14 words (7×2)

6. The "Seventh Day"?

The "seventh day" is mentioned three times in 2:1-3 in three separate sentences, and each sentence is made up of exactly 7 Hebrew words!



- ² And on the seventh day God finished his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work that he had done.
- ³ So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it God rested from all his work that he had done in creation.

5 Timeless Emphases from the opening chapter of the Bible!




1. Creation is about "God" not "gods"





2. The Created Universe is Purposeful not Random





The categorical emphasis is on purpose and function: the sun and moon to rule the day and night, the plants to produce seed and provide food for the living creatures, the fish, birds and animals, to produce after its own kind, and humanity to be God's image-bearer in the world.



Remove God - Remove Purpose!

"In a universe of blind physical forces and genetic replication, some people are going to get hurt, other people are going to get lucky, and you won't find any rhyme or reason in it, nor any justice. The universe that we observe has precisely the properties we should expect if there is, at bottom, no design, no purpose, no evil, no good, nothing but pitiless indifference."



3. Humanity is the Special Focus of Creation



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"You created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well"

(KING DAVID IN PSALM 139:13-14)



4. Humanity is the "Image of God" - Representing God in the World



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Humans represent God to His creation!

"Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth"

(Genesis 1:28)

Humanity's interactions with the rest of the creation must demonstrate the character of God, and the Ministries purposes of God for his world

5. A Work-Rest Pattern in Creation?

Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and "all the host of them. 2 And *on the seventh day God finished his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work that he had done. 3 So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it God rested from all his work that he had done in creation.

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God's design of a 6+1 work week!

In our categories of time, the seven-day week is the only such that is not based on the movements of the sun or the moon. All other categories – the day, the month, and the year – depend on these.
