

The author of Genesis devotes 30% of Genesis 1-11 for the 'Floodstory'!

So what <u>DID</u> it mean?

## The biblical flood-story has counterparts in the ancient world





### Mesopotamian Flood Stories


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The Sumerian Kings list and the Gilgamesh Epic





### The Sumerian Kings List




Two lists of Mesopotamian kings with the story of a universal flood told inbetween:

"These are five cities, eight kings ruled over them for 241,000 years. Then the Flood swept over the earth"

(Victor Hamilton, translation of the Sumerian Kings list)

### The epic of Gilgamesh



Gilgamesh was a king whose longing for eternal life led him to meet Utnapishtim who had survived 'the Flood' and had been granted immortality!



Because Utnapishtim and his wife had outwitted the gods and had survived the flood, the chief god was pressured to bestow immortality on them!

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#### What caused the Flood?

In the Gilgamesh Epic the gods are threatened by humans multiplying and irritated by humans making so much noise!

In the Bible God is grieved by the moral bankruptcy of the whole of society and wants to wipe away sin!

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## Westminster Catechism on 'Total Depravity'

"By this sin they [our first parents] fell from their original righteousness and communion with God, and so became dead in sin, wholly defiled in all the parts and faculties of soul and body.

They being the root of all mankind, the guilt of this sin was imputed, and the same death in sin, and corrupted nature conveyed to all their posterity descending from them by Ministries ordinary generation"

### Five critical aspects of our sincondition in Genesis 6:5

- 1. The magnitude of sin is great: "God saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become"
- 2. The spread of sin is universal: "on the earth"
- 3. The power of sin is thoroughly corrupting: "every inclination . . . was only evil"
- 4. The operation of sin is **insidious**: "the thoughts of the human heart"
- 5. The persistence of sin is enduring: "all the time"

<sup>28</sup> Furthermore, just as they did not think it worthwhile to retain the knowledge of God, so God gave them over to a depraved mind, so that they do what ought not to be done.

## Echoes of the 'Ark' in the books of Moses

Why is baby Moses's watercraft called an "ark" (tevah)?

Exodus 2:3 & 5

Moses is the new 'Noah': saved from the water to preserve a people and start a new chapter of human history in a new land with a new covenant!

#### The Tabernacle and the Ark!

"Have them make a sanctuary for me, and I will dwell among them. Make this tabernacle and all its furnishings exactly like the pattern I will show you"

Exodus 25:8-9

"So make yourself an ark of cypress wood; make rooms in it and coat it with pitch inside and out. This is how you are to build it: The ark is to be three hundred cubits long, fifty cubits wide and thirty cubits high.

## I. The finality of God's moral standards

- Unlike the gods of Mesopotamia, Yahweh God cannot be bribed, He has no favourites, and He cannot be pressured to conform
- Our sin affects God and he suffers the pain of our fallenness
- All sin is intolerable to the Holy God of the Bible Keswick Ministries
