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Therefore, we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal. (2 Corinthians 4:16–18)

(i) Sceptics' Glee: confirming every prejudice?

'Believing something you know isn't true' = delusional

(ii) Pastors' Fears: imagining without constraint?

'Believing something because you'd love it to be true' = **fantasist**

2. The Importance to Faith of the Imagination

(i) A Biblical Imagination

Heb 11:1-2 Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see. ² This is what the ancients were commended for.

(ii) A Reasonable Imagination

CS Lewis

For me, reason is the natural organ of truth; but imagination is the organ of meaning. Imagination, producing new metaphors or revivifying old, is not the cause of truth, but its condition.¹
