Church Expectations: A Community that challenges us

Some people are tempted to abandon church altogether. Why does the church seem to fail constantly? How should we deal with the complexities of church life in all its seasons? Is there ever a right time to leave our church family?

Some signs of an unhealthy church

After an initial honeymoon period, you notice ...

- 1. There is no outside accountability structure, e.g. no external trustees/counsel of reference.
- 2. There is a culture of condemnation rather than encouragement.
- 3. Legalism/rules to follow is the norm, not grace 'cloneliness is next to godliness.'
- 4. Rather than rejoicing in the gospel, people are increasingly burdened.
- 5. There is pressure to agree on secondary issues.
- 6. Scripture is used to silence questions.
- 7. Those who do not conform are publicly shamed or 'ghosted'.
- 8. There is an inner circle.

- 9. The church is increasingly isolated from fellowship with other believers and churches.
- 10. There is a belief that 'we are the only true church.'
- 11. There is a lot of talk about 'church' and less about Jesus.
- 12. Pastor is overly independent and unwilling to share ministry with others.
- 13. Power and authority lie in an individual leader who is never questioned.
- 14. The leader is idolised.
- 15. The pastor's approval is the standard people aim for. Those approved gain status in the church.
- 16. The pastor's disapproval leads to a loss of role.
- 17. The pastor is more concerned with the immediate welfare of *his* ministry than the long-term health of God's sheep.
- 18. The pastor responds to correction with anger and self-defence.
- 19. There is a culture of fear.
- 20. The pastor's sin is overlooked because his ministry looks 'successful'.
- 21. People know there are problems but make allowances because preaching is 'good'.
- 22. People excuse their pastor's sin as 'That's just x ...'
- 23. People stay to protect others from the pastor.

- 24. There is a succession of people leaving due to concerns about the ministry.
- 25. People who leave are cut off/ shunned/criticised.
- 26. People who have left describe feelings of trauma and talk of spiritual abuse.
