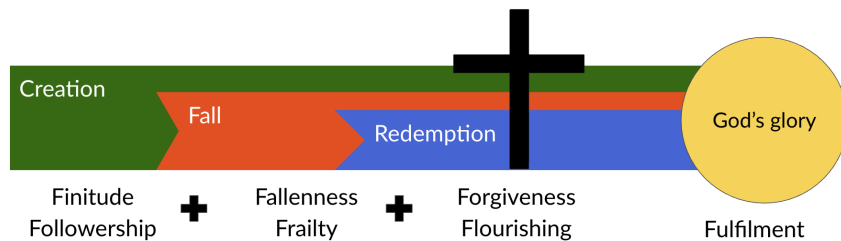

In creation (Genesis 1 & 2)

Boundaries are a blessing
 Finitude is foundational
 Interdependence is intentional

 How might embracing these truths transform your own understanding and practice of leadership?

Under the curse of the fall (right from Genesis 3)

My idol	What others may notice
Control <i>I want it my way</i>	Micromanagement (because nobody does it better...). Focus on tasks rather than on people.
Approval <i>I want to be liked</i>	Do what's popular rather than challenging. Spend time keeping people happy.
Power <i>I want recognition</i>	Selfish decision making rather than 'best for the body'; cultivate those who can open doors for me
Comfort <i>I want an easy life</i>	Avoid taking the lead, hard decisions or difficult conversations; spend time with those I have fun with.
Efficiency <i>I want better, faster</i>	Driven and demanding. Always on, absence of good rhythms. Pursuing results at the expense of people..

Those who lead, and those whom we lead, are both fallen and frail.
 Does my approach to leading and to my leaders acknowledge this?

We need to talk about authority

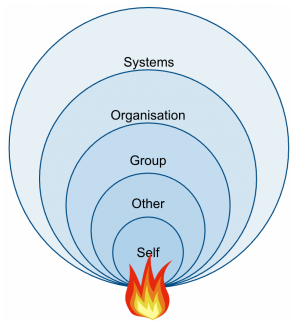

Layers of leadership

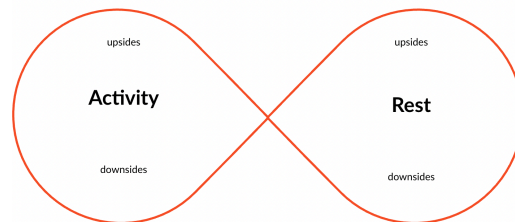
Whether leading one person, a team, a church, an organisation or a network, the state of the leader has a powerful influence. Your character, skills, spiritual vitality, behaviours and relationships infuse everything you lead, whether you intend it or not!

(It's also worth noting that each layer demands different skills. Competence does count!)

Safety AND Risk

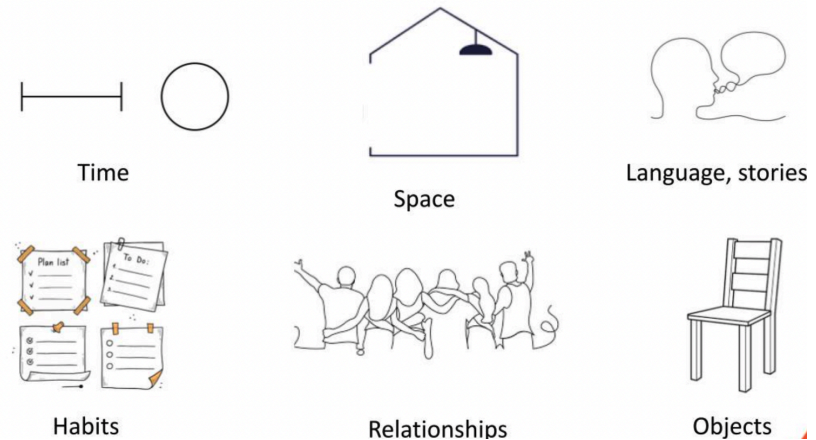
Which of these 'polarities' shows up in or sheds light on a current leadership challenge in your context?
